OUR President's Message

In November 2008, at the request of GNYC, Robert Ponzo and I had dinner with Charlie Rosser, Bob Madsen and Lex Jervis at Blue Smoke in NYC. GNYC invited us out in response to the content of the prior newsletter. The previous issue had struck a number of nerves throughout GNYC and the inclination was that much of the content was inaccurate and insulting. I decided that only Robert (Newsletter Editor) and I (President) would take the meeting to keep it manageable. Regardless of the individuals that wrote the content, as President I'm ultimately responsible and stand by anything the Friends of Ten Mile River publishes or verbalizes.

GNYC objected to the content of the previous newsletter, indicating that there were inaccurate statements made by The Friends of TMR. Charlie indicated that he sees value in organizations such as the Friends of TMR, as he's had experiences with them in the past and understands their genesis. He said that his door is always open, and that in the absence of correct facts we should feel free to pick up the phone and call him to get the straight scoop. He added GNYC has nothing to hide and that he (Charlie) expects everyone on his staff to answer questions truthfully, honestly and openly. Many employees of GNYC read the newsletters of FoTMR, and want to work with FoTMR, appreciate the support of FoTMR, and want to continue in partnership to drive the scouting program.

The conversation continued down the path of clarifying and correcting the statements made in the newsletter. The topics discussed were around The Council's drive to get back to traditional scouting; the definition of traditional scouting being youths that wear the proper, full uniform, work on advancement towards Eagle and participate in outdoor programs as a part of a Boy Scout Troop run by volunteers. There was discussion on how GNYC was launching a renewed focus and priority on traditional scouting and broadening their efforts on fundraising. We discussed the new structure of the Council that is designed to drive the aforementioned goals. Finally we talked about the future of TMR, and GNYC confirmed that there are no plans to sell it and rather that filling the place with traditional scouts (over time) was the priority. good, bad or indifferent. That's our job.

The 2008 GNYC Steakout was held on Sept 6 at Alpine Scout Camp and was very well attended by Scout leaders from all five boroughs. Mr. Mazucca also spoke about the tragic loss of life last summer at the Iowa Scout Camp that was struck by a tremendous tornado and the impact it had on all.

The Friends of TMR will always support GNYC in its efforts at Ten Mile River, even when we do not agree with policies or decisions that are made. We will not punish the scouts by withholding service or the donation of program items. Do rest assured however, that we will continue to report our opinion on the observed activity. GNYC has a tough task ahead of them and we are here to help towards driving the vision of having a Ten Mile River that is once again filled to capacity. If GNYC is serious about getting back to the core, traditional values of the scouting program that the founding members of the FoTMR grew up in, then we are exciting to share that journey.

Personally, I was very appreciative of GNYC's professional approach to resolving an issue that rustled so many feathers and personally “hurt” some of the readership. During dinner I took the opportunity to explain how the Friends of TMR came to be, starting with a visit to TMR in 1996, being upset with what we saw and how the organization was born in the living room of one of our permanent board members. I also went on to explain the purpose, mission and goal of the Friends of TMR.

I'd like to take the opportunity to re-iterate that message here for the benefit of all, including our own membership. Organizations such as the Friends of TMR are not born during good times. Organizations such as ours are born as a result of being dissatisfied or being in disapproval of significant pieces and portions of our lives that have shaped us into the people that we are today. With no sons of my own, I continue to participate in a Boy Scout Troop as a committee member, and when asked why, my response is that “scouting is part of my DNA. It's basically who I am”. Much of who I am was shaped at Ten Mile River in the scouting program.

To this end, it's the purpose of the Friends of TMR to watch, comment, criticize and complement GNYC on their handling of TMR and the NYC scouting program. The Friends of TMR are NOT the TMR Alumni, we are not an alumni organization, nor are we funded by the scouts – we are an independent watch dog organization.

The Friends of Ten Mile River does two main things – we give stuff, not money to TMR for the scouting program and we provide service in the form of bodies and labor for service projects at Ten Mile River. We use the newsletter to report on what we observe and host dinners and mug-o-ree's to raise funds for these tasks. That's it.

To further clarify the definition of “stuff” – we give program items such as water trampolines, go carts and shotguns. We do not donate buildings, structures or computers. In terms of service, we show up with our tools to build picnic tables and tent platforms and participate in post camp inspections.

It is the sincerest objective of the Friends of TMR to print and report the correct facts. However, it is our mission and responsibility to have opinions and observations based on what we see, including an editorial piece in every Newsletter that is based solely on personal opinions. The FoTMR board has over 100 years of combined experience and therefore we have seen many things and have had many experiences. We have seen the best and worst camp directors, staff members and TMR support staff. We have also lived through and with the results of the tenure of the aforementioned roles while giving up our personal time away from our families. We have paid for scouts to go to camp with our own money because of the place that TMR has in our hearts. So, when we see the “less experienced” run TMR head down a path that we've either personally traveled or observed, we're going to verbalize the anticipated outcome –

FRIEND'S DONATION TO TMR PROGRAM

One of the ways in which the Friends of Ten Mile River, Inc. tries to help the Scout program at TMR is by financial donations towards specific program equipment or items for the Scouts to use. What we have done in the past is ask the Director of Camping what new or replacement item(s) did TMR need? Once GNYC purchased the items they would provide us proof of purchase and we would make a financial donation towards the cost of those items. The amount we donate every year is directly tied to our dinner proceeds – so that is why it so important for all of us to support the annual dinner.

This year was no different. Last year it was indicated to us that TMR needed new shotguns for the camps shooting sports programs. But the Council was unable to purchase the guns till this past summer, so we held onto the proceeds from last years dinner and added it to this years dinner proceeds. And after Bob Madsen, GNYC Director of Camping Services sent us a copy of the invoice we made a presentation to the Council a check of almost \$2,200 to cover the cost of the purchased shot guns.



This year also gave us another unique opportunity to make a donation to support a program event. At the end of the summer Shu- Shu- Gah Lodge, Order of the Arrow #24, played host to the OA Section Conclave at Camp Keowa. As part of Saturday night program and show, a fantastic fireworks display was presented. The Friends of TMR was able to make a financial donation to put the display on. It was enjoyed by hundreds of Arrowmen from around the section. Yet another memorable time at TMR!

FoTMR Member Offers New TMR Production To Museum

Robert Ponzo, a permanent board member of FoTMR and Editor of this newsletter, recently met with key TMR Museum Trustees including **Hal Rosenfeld** (a FoTMR member), Karl Bernstein, Dave Malatsky and Bernie Sussman. He presented his offer to create a high impact multi-media show to visitors of the Museum using lights, sounds, images, video and even animatronics about the history of TMR. Robert has been creating Scouting shows since a youth, including starting the National OA Conference Video crew in the early 80's, over three decades of Shu-Shu-Gah Lodge Ordeal shows and several OA Section and TMR promotions shows for the Council. All in attendance seemed enthusiastic, but were highly concerned with the lack of available space in the Museum, the current downturn in the economy, the effort upon the Council, and future direction of TMR. It was agreed that a multi-year approach would serve all well, by first creating a base show and enhancing it year after year as money and space allowed. Although Robert had planned to survey the existing space in December with a few Trustees, it were postponed until the Spring due to a large snow storm. The monies the professionals raise, we all know, none of it goes to the troop directly so when a tent or a cook kit or propane or groceries are needed the volunteer leader often, makes his financial commitment there. For me over the years this is in the tens of thousands of dollars. But I speak only for myself.

I'm not at all insulted by Charlie's comments; as a matter of fact it is a poor sword that doesn't cut both ways. I'm glad he has acknowledged the monetary donations the volunteers have always made and will continue to make for the program. The way I see it the time of "I work for the council so I don't need to volunteer my time," is also over. Mr. Rosser, we are leaving on an overnight this weekend and need adult drivers, and supervision all weekend, have your staff assemble at the church parking lot at 5 PM.Thanks for the team-work....

Baden Powell's Farewell Message To Scouters



To my Brother Scouters and Guides:

Cecil Rhodes said at the end of his life (and I, in my turn, feel the truth of it), "So much to do and so little time to do it." No one can hope to see the consummation, as well as the start, of a big venture within the short span of one life-time.

I have had an extraordinary experience in seeing the development of Scouting from its beginning up to its present stage. But there is a vast job before it. The Movement is only now getting into its stride. (When I speak of Scouting I include in it Guiding also.) The one part which I can claim as mine towards promoting the Movement is that I have been lucky enough to find you men and women to form a group of the right stamp who can be relied upon to carry it on to its goal.

You will do well to keep your eyes open, in your turn, for worthy successors to who you can, with confidence, hand on the torch. Don't let it become a salaried organization: keep it a voluntary movement of patriotic service. For in my experience once salaried, fundraising to ensure continued staff pay becomes a priority over delivery of the program to the scouts.

The Movement has already, in the comparatively short period of its existence, established itself onto a wide and so strong a footing as to show most encouraging promise of what may be possible to it in the coming years. Its aim is to produce healthy, happy, helpful citizens, of both sexes, to eradicate the prevailing narrow self-interest; personal, political, sectarian and national, and to substitute for it a broader spirit of self-sacrifice and service in the cause of humanity; and thus to develop mutual goodwill and cooperation not only within our own country but abroad, between all countries. Experience shows that this consummation is no idle or fantastic dream, but is a practicable possibility - if we work for it; and it means, when attained, peace, prosperity and happiness for all. The "encouraging promise" lies in the fact that the hundreds of thousands of boys and girls who are learning our ideals today will be the fathers and mothers of millions in the near future, in whom they will in turn inculcate the same ideals - provided that these are really and unmistakably impressed upon them by the leaders of today.

Therefore you, who are Scouters and Guiders, are not only doing a great work for your neighbor's children, but are also helping in practical fashion to bring to pass God's Kingdom of peace and goodwill upon earth. So, from my heart, I wish you God-speed in your effort.
